## Edgar Allan Poe

- Edgar Poe is celebrated as the father of detective stories and a significant horror writer and poet. His life was filled with tragedy and drama, which greatly influenced his work. - His poem "The Raven", published in 1845, brought him instant success. However, he continued to struggle financially.
- Poe died under mysterious circumstances in Baltimore in 1849.
